We have also recently made the role of SCA Manager full time to reflect the increased demands of the role outside of the Cambridge term. This decision will enable the charity to continue to best serve our volunteers and beneficiaries.

At the heart of the charity's governance is our commitment to young people. We have been very lucky to work with Hannah, Colver and Ren An who have served as full trustees of the charity alongside their roles on the steering group. The impact they have on SCA should not be understated, particularly in a challenging year like 2021-22. The board thanks them specifically and the entire steering group for their efforts and support.

There have also been changes to the board of trustees. We welcomed on board Sally Liang and Alex De Lusignan and value their insights and input enormously, while we said goodbye to Martha Evans who stepped down earlier this year. We plan to recruit several new trustees in the coming months.

Manager's Report

It's safe to say my hopes of everything going back to normal didn't quite turn out that way in 2021. Although face to face projects did commence where safe to do so, there were lots of additional Covid rules and regulations to get our heads round, which was particularly challenging as they appeared to change on a weekly basis at some points!



It is once again testament to SCA and our fantastic Exec and Steering Group that we were able to navigate the tricky road out of Covid, providing as much support to the community whilst keeping staff, volunteers and most importantly our clients' safe.

For the first part of the year, I was still the only staff member as we waited for things to settle down before we replaced Helen who had left in September 2020 to take up her studies to become a teacher. Although a little stressful at times, it was a privilege to build a relationship with our Anxiety Slayers clients, and support them by finding student volunteers who would check in on them on a weekly basis virtually and provide them with practical support in terms of food parcels and care packages where necessary. As much as I enjoyed the additional client based work, it was a relief and a pleasure to welcome our newly recruited Volunteers and Project's Officer, Rensa Gaunt when she joined us in August 2021.

Rensa wasted no time in getting stuck into developing a new database for us which was one of our strategic aims for the year. After researching what was on offer in the marketplace, Rensa got approval from the Exec to develop the database with Salesforce. Although still in the trial phase, I am confident the new database is going to be a much more efficient and a more environmentally friendly way of storing our data as we strive towards a paperless office. This is particularly important at the moment as we are going to be moving offices in a few months and may have to be more agile in our working practices. A few years ago I would never have believed that SCA could operate so well without a permanent office but it has been enlightening to adapt processes and procedures to make signing volunteer up and running the projects so much easier and more convenient for all concerned.

Financially, SCA has remained very resilient throughout the pandemic. Because we were able to continue to work and support our clients, we were able to access additional Covid specific grants and our existing supporters such as BBC Children In Need and City Council were very good at allowing us to be flexible with how we achieved the targets we had been set. The DBS service has continued to grow and is a significant aspect to our financial stability. We had a financial knock back at the start of the year when BBC Children in Need turned down our new application for three years funding. Their feedback was incredibly helpful though and so with some tightening of our safeguarding procedures, I feel very confident that we will have a stronger application when we reapply in the Autumn. After a three year break from requesting funding, we will be seeking funding from the University Society Syndicate this year and hope they will be able to help us fill the funding gap in 2022 to ensure our services are not affected. We are also investigating some new avenues of funding which, if successful, may help us expand our services to young people and in particular, projects to help their mental health.

As I look to the rest of 2022, one of the greatest challenges is going to be how to fill the shoes of our outgoing Chair of Trustees, Anthony Wheeler. Since he joined SCA as a volunteer in 2016, his drive, enthusiasm, talent and calm personality has helped SCA become more professional and efficient. Personally, I have found Anthony's support to be invaluable and I am going to miss him greatly. True to form, he is not leaving us in the lurch but is continuing to support us to find a replacement to ensure he leaves a legacy of a robust Executive Committee.

Projects Report

I joined SCA in August 2021, working part time as the Volunteers and Projects Officer. Over the past year we have had a lot of success extending our in-person volunteering and moving our office and records online where we can. Our new data management system, Salesforce, means it is easier than ever to connect volunteers and clients with what they need, whether we are working together in person or virtually. Despite running less projects this year, we have



still managed to recruit over 200 volunteers who have supported our one to one projects, groups projects, the running of SCA or being essential support for external organisations. We are currently assisting over 50 clients on our internal projects, with over 120 individuals having been supported this year and more to be matched when possible.

1-to-1 projects

We kept around 25 clients from our Anxiety Slayers project during lockdown and have been accepting new referrals since autumn 2021. Our main 1-to-1 project is Big Sibs (children), and we also have clients and volunteers under Taskforce (adults), Homework Help and English as an Additional Language. Our 1-to-1 volunteers do an amazing job, visiting their allocated person for around an hour a week, and we have had brilliant feedback from individuals and families.

A limiting factor at the moment is the number of male Little Sibs who require a male Big Sib, as we currently have few male volunteer sign ups. We also usually have referrals from the suburbs of Cambridge, which students can find it difficult to travel to.

Christmas present appeal

SCA had its present drive in December, aiming to get a present to all our clients, and the siblings of our child clients if possible. Along with our volunteers, we delivered approximately 50 presents from around 12 gift-givers, meaning that most of our gift-givers gave a large number of presents each and the donation spreadsheet filled up very quickly. This is a testament to the sense of community that SCA brings, and the dedication of our student committee in publicising this opportunity so enthusiastically. Well done all!

WAY youth club

We have been providing volunteers for Waterbeach and Landbeach Action for Youth, which is just a short journey outside of Cambridge. The youth club runs twice a week during the evening, and gives young people in the area the chance to take part in many different activities. We are especially grateful for the hard work of Caroline, other WAY staff and our volunteers in facilitating this project.

A major success from this year has been Bounce, our Saturday kids club. We have around 20 children who attend and around 20 volunteers who help either regularly or occasionally. We are especially grateful to our project leaders, Olivia Taylor and Lewis Francis for running a full year of successful sessions in a new venue with so many new and sometimes challenging participants. Session themes have been as varied as parties, soft play centre visits, bouncy castles, Halloween, Disney and dinosaurs, science experiments, visits from a magician and a dozen of exotic animals! Feedback has been exceptional, and our volunteers do an amazing job of managing whatever the session throws at them.

As we emerge from the pandemic, we are looking at how to resume some of our pre-pandemic projects and/or incubate new projects. I look forward to working with the incoming SCA steering group committee to plan our project strategy for the coming academic year!

Junior Treasurer's Report

2021-2022 saw the resumption of face to face volunteering as we recovered from the pandemic. We are glad that our secure finances have enabled us to serve the Cambridge community effectively. This is credit to the work of the finance subcommittee and SCA team.



The trust grants we received this year totalled to £22,260. This was a decrease from the previous year given that we had received several short-term Covid-related grants last year including the Cambridgeshire Covid Recovery Fund which were discontinued this year. However, we were grateful to continue to receive the final year of a 3 year grant from the BBC Children in Need funding (£14,031) and the City Council grant (£6,000), which are very important to us in running projects that we have resumed including Big Sibs Project, Bounce and Taskforce.

Although we did not seek funding from Society's Syndicate this year, due to having the Covid specific grants, this pot of funding will be critical to us in the coming years to strengthen our financial stability.

The total amount earned from DBS checks this year increased to £26,753. This increase can be attributed to the increase of DBS checks required for physical volunteering and work in the Community and Voluntary sector which had decliened during the first lockdown at the beginning of the Pandemic.

As with previous years, we sent letters to colleges and chapels to request for donations. We have received a total of £4,338. Donations from colleges and chapels has been and remains an important

source of funding for the work we do. Therefore, we are very appreciative of the generosity of the college and chapels for their continued support of SCA. This year, we had hoped to resume fundraising formals that we had done prior to the pandemic. Unfortunately, we were not able to do so due to continuing restrictions on mass booking of college formals. However, we hope the next Steering Group would be in a better position to organise a fundraiser.

Our expenditure this year increased by 14% to £52,365. This increase was due to multiple factors. Firstly, we welcomed a new Volunteers and Projects Officer, Rensa, this year and project costs increased due to resuming a number of our projects. Despite the increase in expenditure, we fortunately maintain a healthy surplus this year, mainly due to the fact we are still not renting an ofice full time.

A breakdown in SCA's income is summarised as below:

- Trust grants: £22,260 (31% of income) + £16,585 carried forward from 2020-2021
- DBS checks: £26,753 (37% of income)
- General donations (Friends of SCA, BSMEG donations, other donations): £1,102 (2% of income)
- Colleges and chapels donations: £4,338 (6% of income)
- Investment income: £1,244 (2% of income)

The good financial position we have this year is a testament to the immense efforts of everyone involved in SCA, particularly Caroline who was instrumental in our trust grant applications and tirelessly worked to provide DBS checks.
